





Generalizations on Space Sleuthing

- For all their practice, the Soviets were clumsy liars, and there's been no improvement since
- The private possession of 'the truth' is a prime source of power and prestige in Russia
- Soviet motivations were political and image;
 Russian motivations are profit and power
- Resources for 'sleuths' are much more extensive these days and satisfactory results are probable
- Despite fears the skill would be made obsolete, it is as needed as ever, and even more fun
- Russians do not resent confrontational style -- it shows respect for the truth

Lessons Learned

- 'Krechet puzzle' lesson -- Fill-in-the-gap with operational experience and informed guesses from Western programs
- 'Missing Cosmonaut' lesson -- Wide-ranging search often reveals inconsistencies that are clues to important coverups
- 'Mars-96' lesson -- Nowadays ('space alliance') both Moscow and Washington find some fictions convenient
- 'Rocket UFOs' -- Reality often appears in disguise
- 'Soyuz Secrets' -- Small clues lead to big secrets
- 'Space Guns' lessons -- Like crabgrass, much of the Russian space industry is connected underground
- 'Follow the money' -- Power follows the payer
